Sulton began her career as a criminal defense and civil rights attorney, representing individuals most marginalized by the justice system. She later taught at area law schools and led legislative advocacy that transformed local policy in Washington, D.C. In 2020, she founded DC Justice Lab, a nonprofit dedicated to reimagining public safety through research, legislative advocacy, and legal training.

Through her work, Sulton has consistently focused on dismantling interconnected systems of racial inequality. At the center, she plans to connect rigorous academic inquiry with on-the-ground advocacy to create sustainable, meaningful change.

"Our work is grounded in the enduring legacy of civil rights lawyers and advocates who braved some of the nation's darkest moments and made transformative strides toward equality. That history fuels our resolve to meet today's threats with steadfast

commitment," Sulton said.
