Emily is the former Forensic Practice Director at The Bronx Defenders, where she represented individuals in the Bronx for ten years as a Staff Attorney, Supervising Attorney and member of the Homicide Practice Group. In 2019-2020, Emily was lead counsel in the Frye litigation People v. Ross/A.M., which was the first admissibility hearing in New York State courts on firearms and toolmark comparison ("FATM") and resulted in an exclusion of all evidence other than the comparison of class characteristics as not generally accepted as reliable by the relevant scientific community. Prior to joining NYSDA in 2023, Emily was a First Chair Trial Attorney at the Office of the Georgia Capital Defender in Atlanta. She currently serves as the Chair of the Legal Task Group to the Organization of Scientific Area Committees under NIST. Emily is faculty for the National Forensic College and trains nationally on litigating forensic evidence and the misuse of science and surveillance in the criminal legal system. Emily received her B.A. in American Studies from Columbia University and was a Guggenheim Fellow in criminal justice and crime prevention. She graduated cum laude from The Benjamin N. Cardozo School of Law, and is admitted to the State Bar in New York and Georgia.
